KDT lesson for **Interrupting Chicken**

Subject: Language Arts

Grade: 1st

Time Length: one week Author: Lisa Kwortnik

Description:

The story, <u>Interrupting Chicken</u> is a humorous, fictional story about a chicken that is constantly interrupting his father during story time. Below are extension activities that can be used with the text.

Major Understandings/Objectives:

To improve social skills by identifying interrupting as socially unacceptable

To identify alternatives to interrupting a conversation To practice oral reading fluency

Key Vocabulary:

Interrupt

Involved

Relaxing

Warn

Panic

Skills:

Making comparisons; making judgments; identifying; explaining; speaking; role-playing, oral reading fluency

Assessment:

Student participation; observation of activities

Procedure:

Below are extension activities that can be used with this story.

Idea #1

Read the story <u>Interrupting Chicken</u> and talk about how the father felt each time Chicken interrupted him during story time. It's also very important to talk about *why* chicken felt the need to interrupt (to save the characters from doing something dangerous or silly).

Then, relate this theme to classroom interactions by using one or both of the worksheets provided (<u>What Would You Do?</u> and <u>Interrupting Chicken/Respectful Student</u>).

After reading the story to the class, role-play various scenarios where someone is being interrupted. Then, decide together, What Would You Do? as a respective alternative to the scenario. You can use the attached What Would You Do? Worksheet.

You can also pair the students and use the prepared "scenario strips" to have students cut and categorize the respectful responses and interruptions (Interrupting Chicken/Respectful Student worksheet).

What would you do?

The teacher is reading a story and it reminds you of another story you have read before.

Have students cut out the subject headings below and place in a T chart. Then, have students glue the scenarios in the appropriate column. You can also use this as whole group activity to discuss respectful behavior without the need to read. \odot

Respectful Student

Interrupting Student

Say, "Excuse me" if you have an emergency and need to interrupt	Hold your hand up the entire time someone is speaking
Yell across the room at a friend while the teacher is teaching	Talk at the same time as a friend
Stay in your seat and sit quietly if the teacher is talking to a visitor in the room	Wait until the teacher has called on you before speaking
Shout out when the teacher is reading a story to the class	Wait until the teacher has finished reading
Yell out an answer while a friend is trying to think about an answer	Look at the person speaking And wait for them to stop before you speak

The poster below may be used as a classroom behavior chart. Minutes are marked off for interruptions or numbers added (to reinforce positively). At the end of a week/day, what remains are the number of minutes students get for academic choice time or some other incentive of your choice.

Papa picked up the story of <u>Hansel and Gretel</u>. He began to read ...


Papa:
